





Why Target Civil Aviation

- Symbolic target
- Multinational Stage
- Unrivalled media potential
- Economic consequences for target nation
- Revenge
- Relatively simple and effective operation


- Diverging group structures impact tactics

Terrorists Tactics (SAM Attacks)

• Man portable Missiles 17 confirmed attacks.



Mombasa Attack November 2002

- Paradise Hotel Attack
- 13 Dead
- 80 wounded
- Arkia Airlines
- Boeing 757
- 271 Passengers and Crew



DHL Attack 22 November 2003

- Airbus A300B4-203F
- 3 Crew
- SA 14
- One missile destroyed the hydraulics systems
- Crew successfully landed using only thrust




Kenya November 2002

- Weapon: SA 7 Stella
- Introduced 1972
- 1.47 Meters long
- 70mm wide
- Range 500-5,500 meters
- Altitude 18-4500 meters
- Speed mach 1.4-1.75
- IR contact HE
- More than 100,000 exported form Soviet Union



Terrorist Tactics (Bombings)


 Bombings: Since 1948 - 97 total of which 88 political.



Aviation Bombings

- Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine General Command
- Founded by Amhed Jibril
- Credited with inventing altimeter detonator switch making aviation bombings possible







Air India Flight 182 June 23 1985

- Boeing 747-237B Emperor Kanishka in route from **Canada to India**
- 329 passengers and crew
- Sikh Separatist group **Baddar Khalsa** responsible
- Part of twin bombings, • other device exploited prematurely at Naritia Airport killing two baggage handlers



Key Suspects



Only two faced any punishment

- Inderjit Singh Reyat served 10 years for the Naritia bombing and 5 for pujery
- Talwinder Singh Parmar killed by Punjab Police in 1992



Pam Am 103 21 December 1988

- Boeing 747-121 named Maid of the Seas
- 259 Passengers and Crew
- 270 killed, all aboard the flight and 11 on the ground in Lockerbie Scotland



Suspects

Abdelbaset Ali Mohmed Al Megrahi

- Libyan Intelligence officer and head of security for Libyan Arab Airlines station in Malta.
- Convicted January 31, 2001

Al Amin Khalifa Fhimah

- Station Chief for Libyan Arab Airlines station in Malta
- Acquitted January 31, 2001




Terrorists Tactics (Hijacks)

 Hijackings: Since 1931 - 1036 total more than two dozen political.



SQ 117 March 1991

- SQ Flight 117 in route from Kuala Lumpur to Singapore
- 114 passengers and Crew
- Operation
 Thunderbolt
- All four Pakistani hijackers killed







Tactics (Others)

Assaults

- Insurgent
- Terrorist Other
- eg. Lasers

- First hijacking 1931
- Late 1940's to Late 1960's hijacking to flee persecution or prosecution
- Ideological hijackings and bombings dominant since the late 1960's

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


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Conclusions

- The industry must invest in non-technical research in orde to support technical security efforts.






• Operational

- International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO) needs to establish
- basic standards for such items as cargo screening, document security
- and other in-flight issues.
- The ICAO needs to have enforcement power, which can a should
- include economic incentives for meeting required standa and recommended
- practices.
- The ICAO and International Air Transport Association (IATA) should
- establish Joint Systems Integration Command (JSIC).



Tactical

- Develop and implement a more coherent tactical response.
- Regular and realistic training is required.
- Assist in developing economically viable responses across the system.
